



# COVID-19 Response Urgent Relief and livelihood support to Affected Families Phase I & Phase II

Reporting period: April 2020 to 30 June 2020





#### **Point of Departure:**

Following the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic and the national lockdown, employment, livelihoods and income of large sections of the people have got severely impacted across the country. With more than 80 percent of India's workforce employed in the informal sector, the lockdown has hit them the hardest. Of the sections most affected are the unskilled labour engaged in informal sector activities in the urban and peri-urban areas, such as artisans, daily wage laborers, unorganized construction sector workers, migrant labour, small vendors, internally displaced people, women headed households, physically challenged small producers, small and marginal farmers etc. With the threat of the pandemic looming large, the living conditions of these sections have considerably worsened, due to lack of mobility and loss of access to essential provisions, safe drinking water and medical assistance. Many of them are facing imminent hunger and destitution.

Manikpur and Bargarh region of Chitrakoot district of Uttar Pradesh have a large proportion of tribal people among their population, making them even more vulnerable. Many people here rely





on the weekly haats (market) to buy their daily essentials for home. Adhering to the guidelines of physical distancing, these weekly markets have also faced closures, leading to hardships in sourcing necessary items for daily use. Most of these villages have ration stores, however due to the lockdown; they are inadequately stocked owing to the disruption in supply. The available products are also poor in quality and there has been a surge in their prices. Due to the sudden halt in economic activities, the farmers do not have enough cash in hand to make transactions to access the day to day utilities. Many were compelled to exchange their agricultural produce at very low prices to buy essentials from the nearby shops.

#### 1. Phase-I: Urgent relief to affected families

#### Overview:

In view of this crisis, Akhil Bhartiya Samaj Sewa Sansthan (ABSSS) provided assistance worth around

- Food basket kit (worth of Rs. 872.00 per family)
- Hygiene kit (worth of Rs. 200.00 per family)
- Intergeneration coping and learning kit (worth Rs 220.00 per children)

Carefully identified most vulnerable families in some of its areas of direct operation (Manikpur and Bargarh) to help the families meet their basic needs and maintain personal hygiene. Each one of these families is very well known to us. Community institutions (Parents groups, mother groups and adolescents gourps) facilitated by ABSSS in the area played a central role in the preparation of the list of most vulnerable families and in the delivery of the kit of essentials item and hygiene kit 2. Intergenration coping and learning kit to children. However, as we began more intensive discussions with our community leaders, they made it clear to us that what people needed most desperately were essential supplies. And that people were finding it very hard to access banks or ATMs. Thus, an extremely complex and logistically challenging operation was undertaken to procure, package and transport kits of essential supplies to families. 690 families all received the kits of essential supplies and hygiene kit and 100 children received intergeneration coping and learning kit.





#### 1.1 Financial approval Phase-I: Urgent relief to affected families:

We have done the relocation of the budget and received approval of Rs 768920.00 for COVID-19 Response for urgent relief to affected families in following manner-

#### 1.2 Selection criteria for the households in need:

The ABSSS team made an assessment of the families that are in dire need of help to brave the repercussions of the lock-down. Most of these families are the ones dependent on daily wage for their survival. Selection of essentials: In every location, 3-4 groups member families were consulted before preparing the list of essentials to be sourced. The number of family members was also kept in mind while budgeting for items that would last for at least a month for the family. Based on this a list of essentials was prepared. It was also ensured that the essentials sourced are of good quality brands.

#### 1.3 Procuring and Packaging of Essential Items:

After preparing the list, quotations for the essential articles were sought from multiple shopkeepers. Following that, essentials were bought from 3 shopkeepers who were willing to sell good quality products at a reasonable rate. The packages were prepared by the shopkeeper according to the list. Process of delivering goods from the shops to the members: Before delivering the essentials to each member, the packages were weighed in the shops in the presence of our staff to ensure that there is no compromise with the quantity. Two members from staff were selected to carry out the distribution task with the team. It was ensured that they are healthy and showing no symptoms of any illness. These staff were handed out the list of the beneficiaries for their convenience. The packages were unloaded from the truck at a convenient place which was decided beforehand. The staff were then called one by one to collect their packages by the selected volunteers from the groups and were given the packages maintaining all social distancing norms. Signatures of the recipients were also taken after every distribution

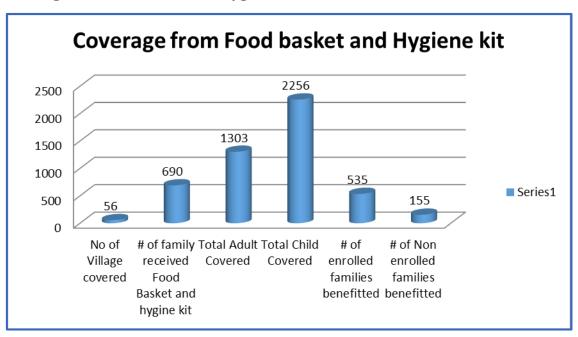

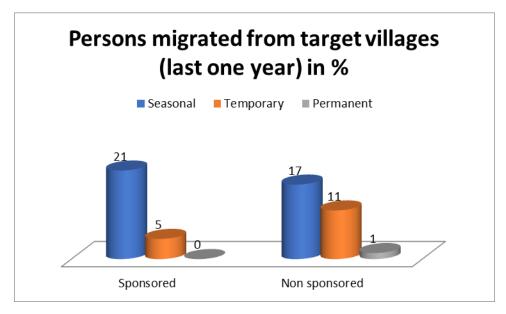


#### 2. Phase-II Livelihood support to effected families:

#### 2.1 Situation analysis of the area:

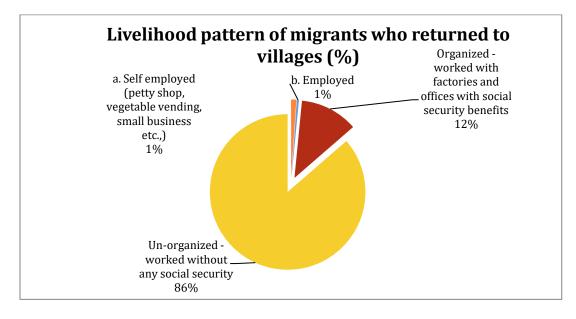
As per the rapid assessment survey for the COVID-19 Response to Livelihood we have covered 56 village of Manikpur and Mau block of Chitrakoot district.

### 2.1.1 Total persons migrated from target villages (%-last one year):



In this survey we found that 21% seasonal, 5% temporary migration rate of the sponsored children in last one year and 17% seasonal, 11% temporary and 1% permanent migration rate of non-sponsored children. *Total 58% migrants returned to villages due to CORONA impact (26% people returned in April and another 32% people returned in May and June 2020.* 

#### 2.1.2 Livelihood pattern of migrants who returned to villages

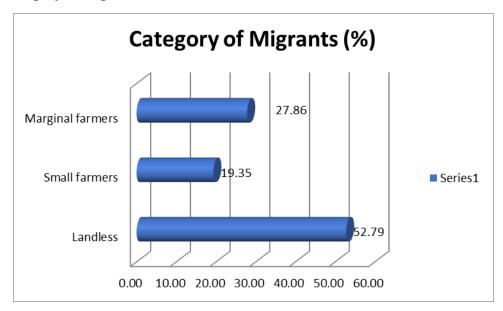






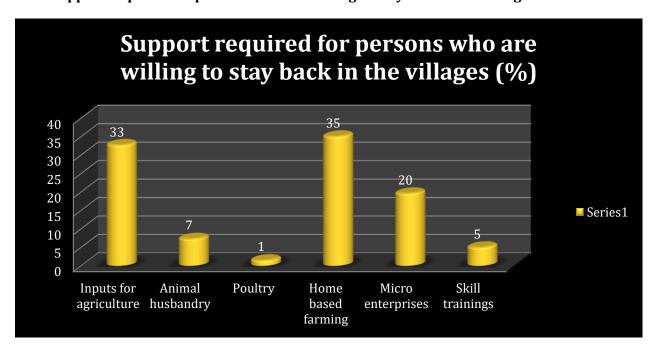
As per the survey we found that 1% people was self-employed who had own petty shop, vegetable, vending and had small business, 1% people was employed, 12% people was organized worker and 86% people was un-organized worker in urban areas.

#### 2.1.3 Category of Migrants:



Above chart show that category of migrants in percentage, in Manikpur and Bargarh location we found that 27.86% marginal farmer, 19.35% small farmers and 52.79% landless.

#### 2.1.4 Support required for persons who are willing to stay back in the villages:







Above chart shows and we found that 33% people required input for agriculture, 7% people required animal husbandry, 1% poultry, 35% people required home based farming, 20% people needed micro enterprises and 5% people required skill training for their livelihood.

#### 2.2 Financial approval Phase-II: Livelihood support to affected families:

We have done the relocation of the budget and received approval of Rs 1010500.00 (A. 757500.00 from Childfund India and 253000.00 from PANI/CFI for COVID-19 Response Livelihood support to affected families (80% sponsored families and 20% non-sponsored families) in following manner-

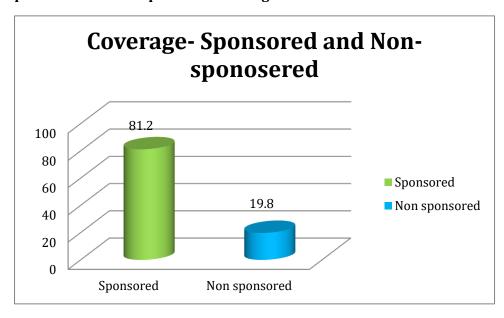
#### 2.3 Support for Kharif crop and kitchen garden:

We have provided kharif crop seed support to famers whose are effected from COVID-19 pandemic. We have provided kharif seed-Paddy, Seas mum, Red gram, Green gram, Black gram, Jwar, Bajra and to 180 farmers of Bargarh region and 538 farmer of Manikpur location. And kitchen garden seed support seeds i.e.- Pumpkin, bottle guard, cucumber, Taroi, papaya, lady finger etc. to same 176 HHs of Bargarh and 600 HHs of Manikpu location.

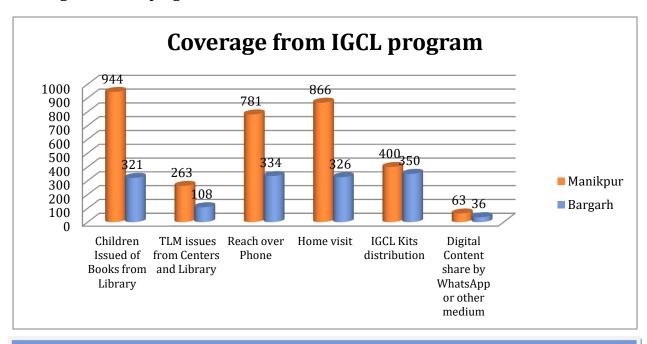

#### 2.7 Sponsor family's barren land development- Horticulture (Fruit and herbal plant) model:

The ABSSS team made an assessment of the families that are in dire need of help to brave the repercussions of the lock-down. Most of these families are the ones dependent on daily wage for their survival and they have barren land so we have developing the barren land to fertile land through horticulture and herbal plantation. Here in Bargarh and Manikpur location main problem is water and animal free grazing hence we provide the fencing to their land and developing land to fertile land.

We are doing work in 2 acre of barren land one acre in Bargarh and one acre in Manikpur location. After the three years farmer will get around 5000.00 per month from their land and it will be increased by years.

We are doing natural farming with 100 farmers of Manikpur and 50 farmers of Bargarh loation and we are doing various components in natural farming with the farmer which are as fallows

#### 3. Precautions taken while distributing the relief packages

- Prior to distribution of the packages, permission was sought from SDM, with whom we shared the list of families and names of the villages/towns. The *PRADHAN* were also informed. They provided their full support to this initiative.
- The number of members to receive the package on a single day was decided in advance and a daywise plan was also made to prioritise villages that would receive the packages first.
- The division of responsibility was made clear to avoid any kind of confusion in the field. For instance, everyone was delegated with specific duties such as supervising, taking pictures, unloading the packages etc.
- The vehicle that was to carry the packages from the shops to the villages was fully sanitized before being loaded.
- In order to maintain proper distance between the members, circles were drawn on the ground at a distance of 1 meter. As the members stood in the formed circles, they were made to sanitise their hands before receiving the packages and were instructed to take a bath after taking it back to their homes and before opening them.
- All the volunteers and people involved in the distribution process were given gloves and masks to ensure their safety. They were also being encouraged to wash their hands from time to time.
- •During the whole process, all government rules and guidelines were strictly followed. And it was made sure that there was no crowd and every task was done in a diligent manner.
